Rationale

This policy statement has been produced to provide a coherent framework from which all faculties can develop a consistent and effective approach for students of all ages and levels of ability. Homework is seen as one of the principal ways in which student achievement can be raised. The benefits of doing homework must be instilled at an early age in all students, so that independent home study becomes routine.

The aim of this policy is to:

- enable students to understand that independent learning is vital to achieving success
- give every student the opportunity to fulfil their potential
- instil in all students the importance of life-long learning
- provide training for students in planning & organising time
- promote a responsibility for learning within each student

For homework to be effective it has to be stimulating and challenging whilst being supported through the quality of the teaching and learning occurring in the classroom. Teaching approaches are suitably varied with appropriately chosen activities and learning experiences. It is on this basis that this policy should not be seen in isolation but as part of the learning and teaching at Wade Deacon High School. This policy and the Learning and Teaching Policy contribute to raising attainment and the quality of the educational experience we provide to students and parents.

Purposes of Homework

There are many reasons for setting homework, examples of which may include:

- to encourage and develop self-discipline, study habits and a range of skills in planning and organising time
- to allow reinforcing, extending and consolidating of work done in class
- to give students experience of working on their own, and to develop in students a sense of responsibility and commitment to their own learning
- to involve parents/carers as partners in education
- to prepare for test/examinations
- to further challenge, extend and support all children of all abilities and talents

Principles Underlying Homework Policy

- Students must take full responsibility for their homework and should be supported by their parents/carers.
- Homework should be issued in appropriate quantities, and completion dates should be both clear and reasonable, taking account extracurricular activities of students, including family and cultural obligations.
- Homework should be a carefully planned and an integral part of course work.
- It should not be seen as an “add-on” or a dispensable extra.

- Homework should match the needs and abilities of students.
- Homework should promote opportunities for consolidation and extension.
- Homework is related to current work and where possible is stimulating and challenging.
- Students should be adequately prepared for the completion of tasks set i.e. they are not to complete homework where the topic has not been covered in class.
- Homework should involve all members of each year group.
- Homework should not be restricted to certain subject areas. It should reflect the breadth and balance of the curriculum.

Types of Homework

Practice exercises – providing students with the opportunities to apply new knowledge, or review, revise and reinforce newly acquired skills, including:

- consolidation exercise e.g. maths, including memorisation of tables
- practising for mastery e.g. spelling words
- practising words or phrases learned in a language other than English
- reading for pleasure
- essay writing

Preparatory homework – providing opportunities for students to gain background information on a unit of study so that they are better prepared for future lessons, including:

- Background reading
- Reading e.g. English text for class discussion
- Researching topics for a class unit of work
- Collecting items e.g. geometric shapes

Extended Learning Pieces – encouraging students to pursue knowledge individually and imaginatively over a period of time, including:

- writing e.g. a book review
- making or designing something e.g. an art work, geographic piece such as a volcano
- investigations e.g. science, geography
- researching e.g. history, local news
- Schools, however, should have regard for equity issues when setting
- homework that relies upon the use of technology. (Students who do not have access to such technology at home should not be disadvantaged).

Revision – enabling students to prepare fully for both internal and external examinations and assessments:

- revising information about a current topic and in preparation for tests and examinations
- Information for P2S tests can be found on the schools ‘Let’s Revise’ webpage.

Show My Homework – is an online package to support the completion of Homework. This enables;

- Teachers to set Homework online which provides pupils with an online Calendar of their Homework and their submission dates
- Students may also write down information in their Learning Journals when homework is set in class
- Students to have an individual login which gives them information about the homework and electronic copies of any additional materials so even absent pupils are kept up to date with homework
- Students have the opportunity to complete online activities such as spelling tests and quizzes
- Students can download the free Show My Homework App which sends push notifications of forthcoming deadlines and events
- Leaders can monitor the volume and frequency of homework setting and completion

Teachers & Personal Tutors

- Class Teachers should issue and monitor regularly, homework undertaken by students whilst ensuring that instructions are stated clearly and uploaded onto Show My Homework.
- Teachers should also ensure that homework issued is recorded by all students in the students' learning journal and sufficient time is afforded to this task.
- Personal Tutors will ensure homework is being recorded and actively seek information from students and class teachers to establish if homework is being set.

Parents/Carers should:

- Log in to Show My Homework via their own individual login which gives them information about the homework and electronic copies of any additional materials their child has been set so they are kept up to date with homework
- Support their child with homework as much as possible and ensure a quiet working environment for this to be completed.
- Provide equipment and materials to aid completion of homework tasks.
- Sign the learning journal weekly to ensure students are recording and completing homework on time.
- Contact their child's personal tutor if they have concerns over homework.
- Utilise the online calendar through Show My Homework

The Role of Students

- At every stage, students should recognise the value of homework, and be fully aware of its capacity to improve learning.
- Students should record all homework accurately and a date for completion.
- Students should complete all homework, on time and to the best of their ability.
- Student should plan their programmes of study, to ensure that their workload is as evenly spread as possible.
- Students should seek appropriate support to ensure that they are able to complete tasks set for homework from their class teacher or other appropriate adult.

Failure to Complete Homework

- Any system to ensure the completion of homework must ultimately involve working in partnership with parents/carers and the students involved.
- All sanctions will be issues in line with the Behaviour for Learning Policy.
